Building up on it's efforts APCCI continued with its volunteering activities on weekends adding more NGOs and young volunteers in it's collaborative efforts. APCCI's Clean City Talks' continued to inspire young volunteers with guidance from experts on sustainability and leadership. One of the major highlights of this quarter was 'Majhi Wari Swachh Wari', a movement initiated by APCCI to help clean Palkhi route covering a total 140 km of roads from Pune city till Saswad and Yawat.

Prof. Jayant Mahajan, a management professor, is currently on sabbatical and cycling across India's borders and remote regions to raise awareness about environmental sustainability. Meanwhile, Pradeep Kumar and Priya Kumari are scaling mountains to advocate for reducing plastic waste and improving menstrual hygiene. All three are part of Change before Climate Change, an initiative founded by visionary social entrepreneur Roopesh Rai to empower individuals in the sustainability movement.

Their stories highlight the power of determination and focus. Pradeep Kumar, who overcame serious medical challenges, believes illness is often more mental than physical. His mindset shift led him undertake cycling expeditions in past three years. Priya Kumari now aims to climb even higher peaks in the Himalayas and beyond, carrying forward her message on plastic waste and menstrual hygiene.

As Prof. Mahajan emphasized, raising awareness isn't just a one-way mission—it's a journey that reveals India's rich diversity and continuously fuels our inspiration to act.

The collection unit installed at Sinhagad Road is being used and appreciated by the waste warriors. The unit features multiple compartments, making waste segregation easier and more efficient. Its user-friendly and cost-effective design showcases the creativity, practical thinking, and skill of the young architects. The presentation sparked a lively discussion among the waste warriors and APCCI staff on how such initiatives could be expanded and refined further. After all, we all share a common goal—a sustainable, cleaner future.

Mr. Krishnan Komandur, CEO, APCCI emphasized the importance of continuity, noting that since this is a student-led initiative, it's vital to ensure that future batches carry the baton forward, building upon and enhancing the existing work.

The students' thoughtful approach—balancing functionality, ease of use, and aesthetic appeal within the context of modern urban environments—was truly inspiring. It's heartening to witness such dedication and innovation from the next generation of architects and changemakers.

The Session was moderated by dynamic Mr. Amitabh Shah, Founder of Yuva Unstoppable. CASCA 2025, presented by M3M Foundation and organized by The CSR Universe, brought together global leaders, experts, policymakers, and innovators under the powerful theme:

"Driving Sustainable Transformation for a Resilient and Inclusive Future."

Mr. Krishnan Komandur, CEO, Adar Poonawalla Clean City Initiative said that the initiative was started by Industrialist and Philanthropist Mr. Adar Poonawalla in 2016 inspired by the clarion call given by Hon. Prime Minister Shri. Narendra Modi during the launch of 'Swachh Bharat Mission'.

Mr. Krishnan who has been in the space of sustainability and waste management since 1994 said that the mission of APCCI is to maintain our city clean and make it more livable. To achieve it we need to ensure that our waste warriors are given a good ecosystem and dignity of work. The state-of-the-art machines commissioned by APCCI along with modern tools and tackles have ensured that waste warriors don't have to come in contact with waste. He said that it gives us immense satisfaction to see most of them come to the mainstream of living and their kids getting proper education and upbringing.

Today APCCI has become a citizen's movement cleaning about 600 km of roads per day with 600 waste warriors and 300 machines, weekend cleanliness activities and awareness sessions.

Adding to the challenge are harmful disposal methods such as open dumping and burning, which not only worsen pollution but also pose serious risks to human health and the environment. This isn't new information—but the urgency of the situation is only increasing.

Despite knowing the dangers, many of us assume our responsibility ends the moment we take out the trash. The truth is far from it. According to the <u>United Nations Environment Programme</u>, global municipal solid waste is expected to grow from 2.1 billion tonnes in 2023 to a staggering 3.8 billion tonnes by 2050.

Without proper segregation, a significant portion ends up in open landfills, contaminating our air, soil, and water. The consequences? Poor water quality, respiratory diseases, infections, and other serious health conditions.

The growing pile of electronic waste and single-use plastics adds another layer to the problem. Open landfills not only threaten public health—they degrade the beauty and liveability of our cities.

And it's not just land that's suffering—our rivers and oceans have become dumping grounds for waste, further endangering ecosystems and marine life.

If we want to change course, we must act together.



'My Wari, Swach Wari' gets Good Response

A team of over 1200 volunteers, NGOs and Gram panchayats teamed up to collect 90 tons of dry waste over a period of four days from 20 June to 24 June 2025. The cleanliness drive was a part of 'My Wari, Swach Wari' movement initiated by 'Adar Poonawalla Clean City Initiative' (APCCI) to help clean Palkhi route covering a total 140 km of roads from Pune city till Saswad and Yawat.

The cleanliness drive is conducted every year where the roads are cleaned within few hours of Palkhi procession by Adar Poonawalla Clean City, Gram panchayats of Loni Kalbhor, Kunjirwadi, Sortapwadi, Uruli Kanchan, Wadki, Saswad, Dive Kalewadi, Zhendewadi, Yavat and volunteers from these villages along with Pune Municipal Corporation who have been a valuable part of the campaign.

This year APCCI installed 65 green nets at various places to enable volunteers to collect and segregate waste without any hassles. Also more than 136 garbage pickup vehicles and machines were pressed into service. APCCI COO Mr. Malhar Karwande, APCCI manager Mr Nilesh Ramekar visited all the villages for coordination and mobilized the volunteers through WhatsApp groups. The dry waste which was collected separately included plastic bottles, paper cups etc. The volunteers were provided with material for cleaning including plogging bags.

NGOs and institutions who have always been a valuable part of the drive include Barclays bank, PMC, Mojhe School, Islamic India, Sayas Foundation, KCB, PCB, ASR Services, karmayogini mahila group Hadapsar, Raje Club, Shewalewadi Mahila Mandal, Shambhu Raje Sanskrutik Mandal Krmayogini Group, Jay hind Groups, Vishwa Hindu Parishad, Paryavaran Sanrakshan Samiti, Sudarshan Yuva Foundation, Gramin Vikas Vidyalaya, Deams Yuva Social Foundation, Karamaai Foundation, Sant Sopankaka Sahakari Bank, Ulali Kanchan Sahjapur, Saswad Nagarparishad aani Vaghire College.

ULBs and volunteer groups worked hard to plan this cleanliness drive for the last fifteen days and over 1200 local volunteers along with 350 APCCI waste warriors were mobilized for this task. APCCI provided the volunteer groups with garbage collection bags, hand gloves and garbage pickup vehicles.

The movement was carried out under the guidance of APCCI CEO Mr. Krishnan Komandur.
























